



THE CIVIL RIGHTS ACT OF 1968 BECAME LAW ON AFRIL 11, 1968. TITLE VIII, KNOW AS THE FAIR HOUSING ACT, MADE IT ILLEGAL TO DISCRIMINATE ON THE BASES OF RACE, COLOR, RELIGION, OR NATIONAL ORIGIN.

THE LAW WAS AMENDED IN 1974 TO PROHIBIT DISCRIMINATION ON THE BASES OF SEX

AND AGAIN IN 1988 ON THE BASES OF FAMILIAL STATUS AND PHYSICAL OR MENTAL DISABILITIES.


IN 1965, OHIO BECAME ONE OF THE FIRST STATES TO ENACT FAIR HOUSING LAW CHANGES WERE MADE TO THE LAW IN 1992, OHIO'S FAIR HOUSING LAW GIVES ALL PERSONS IN THE PROTECTED CLASSES THE RIGHT TO LIVE WHEREVER THEY CAN AFFORD TO BUY A HOME OR RENT AN APARTMENT.

MANY LOCAL GOVERNMENTS HAVE ALSO PASSED FAIR HOUSING LAWS THROUGHOUT OHIO.

You see, Homer knew there were very important laws created by wise people to protect a family's right to live where ever they want. If someone tries to stop them it is wrong and against the law.

Homer and all of his friends have a secret code. Can you help Homer read this important message?











