AUTHORITY AND JURISDICTION

The Cambridge Municipal Court was established in 1952 as authorized by Section 1901.01 of the Ohio Revised Code.

The Cambridge Municipal Court has territorial jurisdiction within Guernsey County, including but not limited to:

City of Cambridge Village of Pleasant City Village of Senecaville Seneca Lake Village of Byesville Village of Quaker City Salt Fork State Park

The Ohio Legislature establishes the territorial jurisdiction, as well as the subject matter of the court. Additionally, the court is governed by the administrative rules of various state agencies, as well as the Ohio Supreme Court. Generally, Municipal Courts in Ohio have the following jurisdictions:

- Felony Cases (Initial appearance/preliminary hearing)
- Misdemeanor Cases (through final determination)
- Civil Actions up to \$15,000.00, including evictions
- All Misdemeanor Traffic violations
- Small Claim actions up to \$6,000.00
- Selected administrative appeals

REPORT OF THE COURT ADMINISTRATOR

2021 saw the Cambridge Municipal Court continue to grapple with the impact of the COVID Pandemic. Case filings and revenues continued to decline due to changes in policing practices, reducing the number of cases filed with the court. With these challenges at the forefront, the court made it a priority to maintain the agility necessary to adapt and change. The court staff continued to respond to these demands with creativity, hard work and a strong dedication to serving the community.

The court had a major change in its leadership team in 2021 with the retirement of Clerk Laurie Endly. Having served since 2005, Clerk Endly is to be commended for her many years of leadership and dedication to the court. Her successor, appointed on November 1, 2021, is Teresa Baker. Clerk Baker has vast experience within the office and has effectuated a smooth transition. She has the well-deserved respect of her staff and has begun her term as Clerk with a reputation for hard work and diligence.

Decreases in case filings in 2021 resulted in commensurate decreases in special fund revenues which provide an important offset to general revenue funding of court operations. Projections based upon available data indicate that this decrease will continue to seriously affect the court budget until at least the end of the 2022 budget cycle.

Recognizing the impact of COVID-19 on court revenue, the Court Administrator was as aggressive as possible in seeking outside sources of funding. During 2021, the Court Administrator applied for and received more than \$360,000.00 in grants and other external funding for improved technology, extended programming in the Probation/Pretrial Services Department, and operation of an expanding electronic monitoring program. Additionally, the Court Administrator coordinated partnerships with other governmental agencies to increase efficiencies and to reduce expended resources.

With expanded funding from grants, the court was able to convert its case management system to more modern, efficient technology. These improvements will enable the court to adapt to case filing increases in future years without having to add additional staff and to significantly improve access to court information. Development and enhanced uses of technology will continue to be a priority in coming years as well.

I am pleased to submit the *2021 Annual Report of the Cambridge Municipal Court*. Its improved content and streamlined format assist in understanding the hard work and accomplishments of the court. It has been my distinct honor to lead the outstanding staff through another year of court operations.

Municipal Court Clerk 2021 Highlights

The Cambridge Municipal Court receives filings from all law enforcement agencies in Guernsey County as well as Civil and Small Claims filings within our jurisdiction. The Clerk's Office filed and entered into the database 6,634 new cases in 2021. The Court held a total of 1,802 arraignments and 106 preliminary hearings. The Domestic Violence cases filed for 2021 were 141, which remained the same as 2020. A total of 8,299 cases were disposed of in 2021 which is an increase from 2020. The Court, as all businesses, is still dealing with the effects of the COVID 19 pandemic.

Court overall receipts for 2021 exceeded \$2,100,000.00. Due to the diligence of the clerk's staff in their pursuance of fine collections, our in-house Fines department monitored and collected \$813,886.68 from defendants who were granted payment plans by the Court.

The Court continues in partnership with the Ohio Attorney General's Office to aid in the Collection of aged delinquent fines and costs resulting in additional collections of over \$36,000.00 in 2021. This free service allows the Clerk's office to seize a delinquent debtor's State income tax refund to offset their unpaid fines and costs.

Capital Recovery Systems, Inc. also actively assisted the Court in collecting over \$82,500.00 in past due accounts in 2021 at absolutely no cost to the Court. Collection fees are paid entirely by the defendants.

In 2021, the Small Claims department continued with the City Prosecutor and the City Treasurer's Office in pursuing and collecting past due income taxes. This attempt to collect delinquent back taxes due to the City was and continues to be a success resulting in \$34, 425.00 paid to the City of Cambridge. As well, the Civil Division paid out over \$327,000.00 in Garnishments in 2021.

The Court continues moving forward with ongoing technology upgrades and enhancements to better serve the public, law enforcement, attorneys, and our community. There is now a total of three agencies in our jurisdiction that are filing traffic violations via E-citations with success. The Court continues to have success with the E-search warrants. The Court continues to utilize the alternatives to in-person visits with the virtual hearings and E-filing via the Court website.

In May of 2021, the Court received a new Case Management System. I would like to commend the clerk's staff for their perseverance, understanding and patience as they learn and work with the new system.

Also, on November 1, 2021 the Court appointed a new Clerk, due to retirement of the previous Clerk, Laurie Endly. Again, I would like to commend the staff for their understanding and patience as we all learn the new system and duties.





TOTAL RECEIPTS FROM ALL DIVISIONS ANNUAL COMPARISON





Probation/Pretrial Services Department 2021 Highlights

Grants:

- *MAT (Medication Assisted Treatment) Grant.* This grant is great for our department and our community. This grant allows us to pay the salary of a probation officer and gives us the necessary tools to get opioid/stimulant addicts the help they need. The grant also pays for Vivitrol, which is an opiate blocker and pays for counseling or any caseload management the offender may need. This grant has been instrumental for keeping the jail population down. This gives our department a way to violate probationers/offenders who would normally be incarcerated by helping them and keeping them out of the county jail. This was a grant that was awarded to us in a previous year. However, Officer Corbett took over in 2021 and grown the program considerably.
- **SEAT Grant.** We now have a grant that allows us to provide free transportation to Probationer/defendants through South Eastern Ohio Transit. Probationer/Defendants are required to report to the Probation Department for urine drug screens, appointments, counseling appointments, court appearances, etc. This grant cuts down on the number of warrants issued for people who are unable to make it into the courthouse (Failure to Appear) and helps with compliance of bond/probation.
- *CHS/OSU Grant.* This grant provides funding to staff a Probation Officer. This grant covers the cost of staffing an officer and pays the entire salary for the year. This grant has been great for the department. Adding another Officer was essential to maintaining proper caseload numbers per officer.
- Body Armor Grant. The Department has now received Body Armor for every Probation/Pre-Trial Officer through this grant from the Ohio Attorney General. The Ohio Law Enforcement Body Armor Program has awarded seven officers body armor through the grant. The monetary amount awarded by this grant was \$3,363.75.

Community Service Program:

• Over the past year our community service program has grown considerably. We have extended community service working days from three to five days a week. In the past three years our program has helped the City of Cambridge with mowing, community clean up days and other projects/jobs. Our program also works with other agencies as listed in this report. When the community service officer is out of the building for personal or vacation days, the probation department is responsible for the supervision of the workers. This often happens last minute. Our Officers have done a great job stepping up and taking on the extra responsibility. During the past year out, Community Service program has done a great job coordinating with the City of Cambridge. Helping the City is the number one goal for the program.

COVID Operations:

• Providing court security (attending new trainings for court operations), serving as bailiff both in the courtroom and at the jail for video arraignments/trials. The probation department has taken on those responsivities as well as continuing to engage in previous responsibilities. This has taken up more time and effort on each induvial officer. The department has done a great job of taking on the new tasks.

Felony Bond Supervision:

During the past year the Pre-Trial Department has started supervising felony pre-trial cases. We have supervised these cases in the past but due to recent changes in the Ohio Revised Code on how bond is set that number has risen dramatically. Our Pre-Trial department is working with Common Pleas Adult Probation during the transfer of these cases to ensure there is no gap in supervision. Officer Dee McInerney is the assigned Officer on these cases and she has gone above and beyond to ensure compliance with defendants.

GCSO Security Contract:

• In January of 2021 the court went into contract with the Guernsey County Sherriff department to provide security at the courthouse. This has been beneficial to the department in numerous ways. Having deputies here to cover security has allowed Probation Officers to focus more on caseloads which has led to a higher compliance rate. Higher compliance rates for defendants/probations ensures a safer community. It has also allowed the department to have a better working relationship with the Sherriff department.

Increased Collection of Supervision Fees:

 One of the major goals of the Department over the past three years has been to collect more Probation Fees from Probationers. It is now standard practice for Officers to routinely go over this topic with probationers to ensure compliance with paying fees. In 2021 the department collected \$121,508.59.


